

You can see it's looking a bit rough and could do with a new floor and some tidier fittings.

So we handed over some money to the local councillor, who will then oversee the project to replace the wood and



roof and lay the floor. The teachers are very happy as you can see!

Through a chance meeting, we got invited to view the activities of the Barangay Health Workers and their feeding programme for under-nourished children.



This is just another activity that takes place, eight days each month, at the Barangay Hall.

On these days, about 50 local children get a meal consisting of a couple of pieces of chicken and vegetable, in a thin soup with vitamin supplements, and copious quantities of rice.



It made us think, if this is a "good" meal, what do they eat on all the other days of the month?

In commented that they had nowhere

Jo commented that they had nowhere to eat this and a spillage of this hot meal could wreak havoc on a young body.



So we got the carpenter to make three low tables and they were taken to the Barangay Hall just before we left to come back to the uk.





we were fortunate to attend a parent/ teachers committee meeting, and it gave us an opportunity to understand a little more of the difficulties the parents face in just trying to keep their children in school.

we asked the High School Principal for a breakdown of the annual school costs. It comes to less than £3.

Some parents said they just can't afford these for all their children.

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Other parents told us about the additional costs, even down to pencils and ball-point pens. We already had quite a lot of these in the parcels we'd sent out but we decided to buy some more so that each child in the school got a new pencil and pen. That's over 900 of each by the time we'd counted them all!

#### The scholarship and medal scheme

It's not much, but it may help a little. We've set up a bursary to pay the school fees for ten students from the last year at elementary into first year High school, ten from first year High into second and so on through High school. The top ten students in the final year will get an award as a record of their achievment.

#### grills for the computer room

The building on the right is the Principal's office for the elementary school. For the last two years it has been where the computers have been, because it is the only room with metal grills on the doors and windows.

As ever, we managed to supply some more computers to both the schools. This always involves more benches being made and electrical wiring etc. Installation always takes a few days but it's always worth it when you see how well-received these gifts are.

Even allowing for a couple of failures over the year, we now have fourteen computers in the high school.





We added another computer to the Barangay Hall, complete with an all-in-one scanner/printer unit.


